Welcome to the 2026 Sacramento County Fair!

This year's Fair dates are May 21-25, 2026



Please take the time to read the rules and your specie rules. As an exhibitor, parent or advisor, it is your responsibility to know the rules. If something is not clear, please ask. We are here to assist you and want everyone to have a great Fair experience.

California Department of Food and Agriculture will be continuing the mandatory Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) program. Livestock exhibitors, excluding horse, dog, and cavy; must provide proof of completion in order to be eligible to show at any California Fair. For additional information please go <https://yqcaprogram.org/>.

The volunteer program is vital to the Sacramento County Fair. We believe that by getting involved in YOUR Fair, everyone has a better experience. We would love to expand the program, please contact the office if you are interested. The workdays are mandatory for all exhibitors.

Please note any exhibitor staying in the Cal Expo RV Park must have an adult in the RV Park at all times. If exhibitors are found to be unchaperoned at any time while in the park, they will be immediately disqualified from the Fair, not allowed to exhibit any project and will not qualify for the Junior Livestock Auction. If students are found to be unchaperoned in the RV Park following the JLA Auction, exhibitors will forfeit their JLA auction proceeds. All SCF exhibitors shall abide by their organizations code of ethics and code of conduct as specified by 4-H, FFA and the Sacramento County Fair at all times. Independent exhibitors are required to abide by the same rules during the Fair. These rules may be found on the 4-H and FFA websites.

Our carnival partner, Midway of Fun, continues to reward the livestock exhibitors by offering a \$60.00 wristband good all week for carnival rides. Please see the respective page in this book. Wristbands must be purchased at time of online entries and there is **a limit of only one per livestock exhibitor**. This is also a great time to purchase event tickets for the arena events and save money. **Please note, we are unable to offer any refunds on wristbands, entries or any fees associated with an exhibitor.**

The test will be a test on general livestock knowledge. It will include questions covering all large and small animal species. Many questions will be applicable to multiple species. Examples include but are not limited to nutrition, anatomy, physiology, reproduction, genetics and general animal showmanship. The test will be untimed and use a scantron answer sheet. A test bank of questions without answers will be provided on-line through the Sacramento County Fair website for study purposes. Test make-up: 50 general animal knowledge questions made up of multiple choice, true/false and matching.

Results: The high numeric scores in each division will be the winners. Ties will be broken using the following criteria; high point matching, then multiple choice, then true/false. Winners will be announced at the beginning of the Sale of Champions.

SIGNIFICANT CHANGES FOR 2026

Schedule

Please be aware that some shows have changed dates and times.

Resident of Sacramento County

All market animal exhibitors must reside within Sacramento County and provide proof of residency, if requested. If an exhibitor resides outside of Sacramento County, exhibitor must be a member of a club or chapter that resides within Sacramento County. Those exhibitors who show at other county fairs may not show market animals or participate in the livestock auction at the Sacramento County Fair; if they also show and/or sell market animals at another county fair livestock auction.

Showmanship

Showmanship on behalf of the fair is no longer mandatory. If you would like to participate in showmanship you will need to complete that entry on your own. We will not add any entries after the deadline if you forgot to enter. Showmanship is separate from your animal entry so you must do a showmanship entry if you want to compete in showmanship.

Also, you cannot compete in showmanship without an animal entry so you must enter and show your animal to show in showmanship.

If you forget to enter your animal but do a showmanship entry you will be scratched, we cannot add an animal entry after the deadline.

Color Enhancement

No color enhancing products, paint, dye or other can be used at the fair. If color enhancement is used at the fair, the animal will not be allowed to show. All tails will be natural in nature (i.e. no blue-goo). No twining allowed.

Boer Goats/Market Goats- No powder allowed

Couty Bred and Fed- Hogs and Sheep

Entries will now happen on showworks. Please remember to add this entry to your online entries before the deadline.

State Rule Change

Exhibitors must provide an original registration certificate (not a copy). Breeding animals entered in the Junior department may be jointly owned by siblings provided the animal is entered and exhibited solely and in the name of one individual junior exhibitor, and that the exhibitor is one of the siblings listed on the registration paper issued by a recognized breed association. All entries must be registered and recorded by a recognized breed association in the name of the exhibitor(s). A 30-day consecutive ownership requirement applies to each sibling. Animals with a farm, family, ranch or non-sibling owners name listed as the owner are not eligible to enter. (See specific specie or schedule for date and time)

Primary Showmanship

Entries must happen online this year and will make the primary member an exhibitor. They must be enrolled in a 4-H or Grange club and be verified by their leader as eligible.

JUNIOR LIVESTOCK SHOW AND AUCTION

COMPLETE RULES AND GUIDELINES

Rules and schedule are subject to change at any time based on the livestock committee and the Sacramento County Fair Board of Directors.

ENTRY RULES

Fees

1. Insurance fee - \$5/exhibitor: all livestock exhibitors (small and large) are required to pay this mandatory insurance fee.
2. Office fee - \$5/exhibitor: all exhibitors will pay a one-time office fee.
3. Entry fee - \$15: for each market, breeding and showmanship entry, unless otherwise noted
4. Horse insurance fee - \$25: all horse exhibitors are required to pay this mandatory insurance fee.

Guidelines

1. **SHOWMANSHIP IS NOT MANDATORY... You must enter to compete.**
2. **All entries must be submitted online via ShoWorks. Entries will not be accepted by mail, fax or e-mail. Entries are due April 17, 2026 by 11:59pm online. Late entries will not be accepted, per CA State Rules.**
3. Exhibitors cannot enter more than two market entries. Any more than two entered will be scratched and no fees refunded.
4. All fees must accompany entries (livestock entry, insurance, office fee). Entry fees and any fees associated with entries are non-refundable. Entry fees for exhibits that are withdrawn or not displayed by the exhibitor will not be refunded. Overpayments due to calculation errors or mistakes will not be refunded.
5. Fill out entry clearly and completely. It is implied that an entry is signed when entered online.
6. Fair management reserves the right to limit exhibits to facilities available and may limit the number of exhibits entered by an exhibitor.
7. Fair management reserves the right to return entries, cancel any division or class, or combine divisions and classes in which, in its judgment, the entries are insufficient to secure adequate competition.
8. A complete exhibit eligible in more than one division and/or class shall be entered and judged in the division and/or class for which it best qualifies. Fair management reserves the right to make this determination.

LOCAL RULES AND EXPECTATIONS

1. **All exhibitors, parents and leaders are expected to abide by the Sacramento County Livestock Market & Showmanship's Code of Practice/Code of Ethics/Code of Conduct (see page 22).** It is expected that while on the Fairground, all rules will be followed and all exhibitors, parents and leaders will conduct themselves in a professional manner. There will be zero tolerance for any exhibitor, parent or leader that misrepresents the animals being shown in any way.
2. **MARKET SWINE EXHIBITORS- Prop 12 Breeder Certificate must be uploaded with each market swine entry on showworks.**
3. Animals not entered in the show are not allowed to be on grounds.

4. Parking tickets will be issued for all unattended vehicles or if a vehicle is parked in a “**No Parking**” zone.
5. Stalls and pens must be cleaned no later than 8:00 a.m. daily.
6. Barns are to be kept clean at all times including main aisle ways. Barn sweeping is the responsibility of EVERY exhibitor.
7. Fair management reserves the right to combine or cancel any classes that have three or fewer entries.
8. Market checks will only be awarded to exhibitors if “Thank You” cards are turned into and animal pens are torn down. Checks will be made available once all buyers have paid. Any unpaid exhibitor balances will be withheld from premium or market checks. All livestock pens must be torn down, stacked and banded prior to exhibitors leaving facility on May 25.
9. All market animal exhibitors must reside within Sacramento County and provide proof of residency, if requested. If an exhibitor resides outside of Sacramento County, exhibitor must be a member of a club or chapter that resides within Sacramento County. Those exhibitors who show at other county fairs may not show market animals or participate in the livestock auction at the Sacramento County Fair; if they also show and/or sell market animals at another county fair livestock auction.

VOLUNTEER PROGRAMS FOR PARENTS/EXHIBITORS

The SCF livestock shows are primarily administered by volunteers. Each year, the volunteer program grows due to the commitment of our volunteer leaders. We appreciate their dedication and commitment to the Sacramento County Fair. It is a requirement for the parents/families to give back and become involved in the SCF. All exhibitors are required to attend the mandatory work day(s) at the SCF and be available to assist at the Fair.

Pee Wee Showmanship- Participants are not considered Exhibitors

1. Pee wee showmanship participants must be between 5 years and 8 years old of the current year to show swine, sheep, goats, beef and dairy and may only participate in pee wee showmanship.
2. These individuals do not pre-enter and are not considered exhibitors
3. Sign up will be at the ring and parents must sign a liability release to participate.

EXHIBITOR AGE AND UNIFORM GUIDELINES

The exhibitor’s age on January 1 of the current program year will be used to determine eligibility, unless otherwise noted.

All junior livestock exhibitors must fall into one of the following classes -

FFA Members

1. FFA members may exhibit at the Fair if they are enrolled in high school vocational agricultural classes. They may continue to exhibit as members for one full year following graduation.
2. The official FFA show uniform will be worn by all FFA exhibitors, helpers, and chapter groups while showing at the Sacramento County Fair. Hats or headgear of any kind shall not be worn with the official show uniform while showing. Exhibitors showing cattle must wear boots and exhibitors showing horses must wear boots and helmets. No open toe shoes are allowed in the show ring.

4-H Members

1. 4-H member who is nine years-old or older on December 31st of the past year may exhibit as a 4-H member and participate in competitive 4-H classes and may continue to do so until the end of the calendar year in which the member has his/her 19th birthday.
2. Exhibitors and helpers will wear the official 4-H uniform. "All 4-H exhibitors must be in 4-H uniforms when showing their animals in 4-H divisions or be disqualified from the class. 4-H exhibitors will wear a plain white shirt with collar and their choice of white pants or skirt, the appropriate 4-H hat and a 4-H tie or scarf." Exhibitors showing cattle must wear boots and exhibitors showing horses must wear boots and helmets. No open toe shoes are allowed in the show ring.

Grange Members

1. Any Grange member who is nine years-old or older on January 1st of the current fair year may exhibit in competition as a Grange member until the end of the calendar year in which the member has his/her 19th birthday.
2. The official Grange show uniform will be worn by all Grange exhibitors and helpers. Dark blue denim pants; white long sleeved, button-front dress shirt with collar; the official red waist vest with Grange emblem on the back; black or brown belt with appropriate buckle. Exhibitors showing cattle must wear boots and exhibitors showing horses must wear boots and helmets. No open toe shoes are allowed in the show ring. Exhibitors in small animal species classes or still exhibits may wear closed toe black or brown shoes with an enclosed heel. All Grange Youth Fair Program groups exhibiting at a local fair may agree, due to weather, to alter the shirt of this uniform to a short-sleeved white button front shirt (no sleeveless shirts). The waist vest shall be worn secured in the front. Hats or headgear of any kind shall not be worn with the official uniform while showing other than horses.
3. Grange members 9-13 years of age will enter/compete in 4-H Divisions and Grange members 14-19 years of age will enter/complete in FFA Divisions.

Primary Members

1. Sacramento County Fair supports the 4-H philosophy and rules regarding competition and youth under 9 years of age. "Fairs are open to Primary members for exhibit only. The use of Danish and American systems of judging is not acceptable for use with Primary members. Primary members should only receive recognition for their participation." Primary members may only show in the primary showmanship.
2. Any 4-H member who is under nine years-old but at least five years-old on December 31st of the past year is invited to participate in primary showmanship (dog, rabbits, poultry, covies, Pygmy goats and Nigerian goats) as non-competitive. All participants will receive a participation ribbon. 4-H uniforms are to be worn.
3. Any Grange member who is under nine years-old but at least five years-old on January 1st of the current fair year is invited to participate in primary showmanship (dog, rabbits, poultry, covies, Pygmy goats and Nigerian goats) as non-competitive. All participants will receive a participation ribbon.

Exhibitor Age Requirements for Livestock Exhibition

1. Market & Breeding Classes - Exhibitors must be 9 years old on January 1 of the current fair year to exhibit any market animal (beef, lamb, hogs, rabbit, poultry, eggs and goat).
2. Rabbit exhibitors must be under 19 as of fair date in accordance with ARBA Show Sanction rules.

**Age/ownership rules apply to all livestock participants at the Sacramento County Fair.*

INDEPENDENT EXHIBITORS

1. Youth not affiliated with 4-H, FFA, or Grange can exhibit in appropriate FFA or 4-H Livestock classes as Independent junior exhibitors, provided they meet the age or grade level requirements.
2. Independents must have declared with the fair office, of the current fair year in order to be eligible to show.
3. Fair management may establish separate animal classes for Independent exhibitors, provided there are a sufficient number of entries.
4. An Independent exhibitor cannot have been a member of a junior organization within 60 days prior to the opening of the Fair in order to be eligible to participate (120 days for market beef and horse). For any additional clarification, refer to State Rules.
5. Independent junior exhibitors entering market animals must submit to the Fair Manager the following documentation:
 - a. A bill of sale with the exhibitor's name and date of purchase of animal.
 - b. A photograph of exhibitor with the animal including any brands, ear tags, or ear notches that would uniquely identify that animal.
 - c. Verification of the animal's permanent tag and/ or tattoo.
6. This documentation must be submitted to the Fair based on the following schedule per species being exhibited by the exhibitor: (These dates may be before entry deadline)
 - a. **Market Beef** – 120 days prior to the first day of the fair
 - b. **Market Sheep, Goats and Swine** – 60 days prior to the first day of the Fair
7. Independent exhibitors must be at least 9 years old, but not older than 18, on January 1 of the current program year.
8. Independents are responsible for scheduling their picture for the required sale placard picture (see Livestock Auction Rule #2).
9. Independent junior exhibitors shall wear clean, dress whites for showing that includes ankle length white pants and a white collared shirt. Exhibitors showing cattle must wear boots and exhibitors showing horses must wear boots and helmets. No open toe shoes are allowed in the show ring.
10. Independent Exhibitors 9-13 years of age will enter/compete in 4-H Divisions and Independent Exhibitors 14-18 years of age will enter/complete in FFA Divisions.

LIVESTOCK OWNERSHIP REQUIREMENTS

Listed below are the numbers of consecutive days the exhibitor must own his/her animal prior to the opening of the Fair. Fair management may demand such proof of ownership as necessary. All animals in each entry must be owned by one exhibitor and be entered as individuals.

Market Animals:

1. Beef 120 days
2. Swine, Sheep, and Goat 60 days
3. Rabbits & Poultry 30 days
4. Turkeys 30 days
5. Eggs (producing hens) 60 days

Breeding and Feeder Animals 30 days

Horses (leased or owned) 120 days

CREDENTIALS

Parking passes for exhibitors are available at a rate of \$7/day or \$35 for a season pass, valid for all 5 days of the fair. Parking passes are for Lot D, at the corner of Exposition Blvd and Challenge Way. Exhibitor parking passes will be available for purchase on Showworks, at discounted exhibitor rates, through the close of entries. After entries close, exhibitor passes will be available at the livestock office on (Tuesday) May 19th and (Wednesday) the 20th.

The Sacramento County Fair pays Cal Expo for parking and makes no income from parking.

Note* the Fair does not supply free parking passes for exhibitors.

Additional parking pass pricing and availability:

1. Vehicles are permitted to make **deliveries** to the barn area, prior to 8:00 a.m. **Parking in the barn area, at any time**, is prohibited. All vehicles must be out of the levee/barn area by 8:00 a.m.. Vehicles on grounds after these times may be ticketed or towed. **All vehicles parked illegally or without a levee pass will be towed away at the owner's expense.**
2. **A levee parking pass** allows parking in an assigned parking space in the barn/levee area, for the duration of the fair. New levee parking applications will be available at sacfair.com on March 1st, 2026.
3. If a levee pass was issued in 2025, you will receive an emailed renewal letter in early February. **LEVEE PARKING IS NOT TRANSFERABLE** between cars or people. Prior to May 1st, a levee parking pass is \$150.00. Beginning May 1, 2026, the price increases to \$175.00. Levee spots are assigned based on waitlist order, space availability and vehicle size and cannot be transferred to another vehicle or person. 4. **Every person in the vehicle must have an admission pass to enter the grounds.**
5. There are a limited number of reserved passes available for exhibitors, leaders, or advisors with physical mobility restrictions. (The same fees apply for parking).
6. R.V. parking is available on a limited availability. Contact Cal Expo for the Cal Expo RV Park at 916-263-3040. No refund on camping spaces. Limited hook ups are available. Every space sold must have adult supervision throughout the entire Fair. The adult that signs the R.V. registration form will be held responsible for that space. An adult must stay in the R.V.
7. Parking for livestock trailers is available at no charge, in Lot 26. No security will be provided.
8. **A paid gate will be in effect at the 2026 Sacramento County Fair. Gates will be monitored beginning at 6:00 a.m., May 21-25, 2026.**
9. All livestock exhibitors will receive a wristband allowing access to the fairgrounds. If lost or broken, exhibitor will have to purchase a season pass credential for \$40.
10. A \$40.00 seasonal admission pass/person is available to all livestock families. Children under 12 are admitted free. will be available for purchase at special exhibitor rates from showworks through the close of entries.
11. Complimentary admission credentials will no longer be provided to individual leaders but instead provided to the 4-H clubs or FFA schools to distribute. One complimentary leader/advisor admission pass per specie per club or school will be provided by the fair. Complimentary admission credentials provided by the fair will be dependent on actual livestock entries per specie per club or school. This will be determined after entries have closed.
12. Admission credentials will be available for pick up by community club leader or advisor at the livestock office beginning May 19th

LIABILITY

1. The owner or custodian of property of any kind brought to Cal Expo either for exhibit or for other purposes assumes as a condition of its admission to the grounds, all risk and/or responsibility for its loss, damage or theft.
2. The Fair, its officers and employees, cannot and will not accept responsibility and liability for any damage or injury resulting from theft, fire, the elements, accidents or other

conditions or causes; whether to exhibits, property of exhibitor, vehicles on the grounds and articles left therein or any other property of any nature whatsoever.

3. Exhibitors, either through appropriate liability insurance or other means satisfactory to the 52nd District Agricultural Association, will defend, indemnify and hold harmless the State of California, the Association and the Sacramento County Livestock Fair from any claim arising out of the failure of the exhibitor to exercise control of his or her exhibit. Livestock exhibitor's parents or legal guardian are required to sign a disclaimer on the entry form.
4. All livestock exhibitors must pay insurance fee, see "entry rules, fees".

FAIRGROUND RULES

1. The Sacramento County Fair is a smoke-free facility. Smoking is not permitted on the fairgrounds.
2. A responsible adult must be in attendance at all times in the livestock areas to represent each club, chapter or independent exhibitor participating in the livestock department.
3. No barbecuing or open fires in the barn or barn area at any time.
4. The possession and/or use of alcoholic beverages and/or illegal drugs by any minor is prohibited on Cal Expo property and will result in immediate expulsion from the Fair and forfeiture of awards, premiums and monies received at auction. This includes the camping facility on the Fairgrounds. **Anyone caught violating rules will be disqualified and forfeit all JLA monies.**
5. Absolutely **NO PETS ALLOWED** in the barn area or on the fairgrounds. Only animals entered in competitions are allowed on the fairgrounds in designated show areas only! Exceptions will be made for service animals on a leash.
6. Any exhibitor found guilty of any form of mistreatment or cruelty to livestock such as salting, force feeding, muzzling, or tying animals while in pens to restrict them from feed or water, etc. will forfeit all premiums and privileges.
7. Stall decorations - all material and decorations used in an exhibit must be made from a nonflammable material or treated and maintained in a flame-retardant condition.
8. See schedule for barn hours.
9. No skateboards, motor scooters, motorbikes, roller blades, roller skates, bicycles, or golf carts, or similar personal wheeled devices will be allowed in the livestock area. They may be used from the trailer lot to the top of the hill but not into the livestock area.
10. Fair management reserves the right to disqualify and/or remove any exhibit that is not in the best interest of the Fair, including any livestock exhibit which endangers the well-being of the public or other animals while at the Fair.
11. Exhibitors, leaders, advisors and parents who violate these rules, or who are found to be involved in unethical or hostile practices with the Fair, shall incur penalties that may include (but are not limited to) disqualification, removal from the Fair, forfeiture of awards and ineligibility in future Fair competitions.
12. The use of swine canes or swine show tubes in the show ring, on auction or load out day will not be allowed. Show slappers and similar approved show aids will be allowed.
13. Sacramento County Fair is not responsible for lost or stolen items during the Fair.

WEIGHT LIMITATIONS

Beef

Show Weight: 1100 - 1400 lbs., over 1400 can sell, if market ready

Sheep

Show Weight: 100 - 150 lbs., over 150 can sell, if market ready

Swine

Show Weight: 210 - 290 lbs., hogs over 290 will only be eligible for showmanship

Goats

Show Weight: 60 - 100 lbs., goats over 100 can sell, if market ready.

Turkeys

Show Weight: 18 - 40 lbs. turkeys not within this range will only be eligible for showmanship

Chickens

Show Weight: 4 - 6 lbs. chickens not within this range will only be eligible for showmanship

Rabbits

Show Weight: 4 - 5.5 lbs. rabbits not within this range will only be eligible for showmanship

Animals exceeding show weights may sell but will only receive price up to the maximum weight.

The Sacramento County Fair places minimum and maximum weights on market animals to be consistent with packer demands and consumer trends. We adjust these weights from year to year accordingly.

ANIMAL IDENTIFICATION REQUIREMENTS

1. All sheep/goats entering fairs require individual identification. All official identification will be kept on the animals. The official identification may be official USDA individual identification ear tags, premises ear tags, Scrapie Flock Certification Program ear tags, registration tattoos if accompanied by registration papers, or other methods approved by the California Department of Food & Agriculture.
2. Fair will not accept sheep from scrapie "non-compliant" flocks, or animals that are Scrapie-positive or Scrapie suspects or animals that have been exposed to Scrapie unless they have been evaluated and approved for exhibition by the state Scrapie epidemiologist. **Scrapie number must be on the entry form. Record both sides of the tag.** Animals with missing or incorrect scrapie tags are subject to disqualification.
3. Flock number and breeder's initials, name or association prefix shall be on commercially used tags attached to the ear or tattooed in the ear for yearlings and lambs bred by the exhibitors.
4. All swine entering the fair require individual identification. All official identification will be kept on the animals. The official identification may be official USDA individual identification ear tags, premises ear tags, registration tattoos if accompanied by registration papers, or other methods approved by the California Department of Food & Agriculture.
5. **Premise number must be submitted with entry for swine from out of state. Record both sides of the tag.**
6. Brucellosis tags must be declared on the entry form. Proof of Brucellosis vaccination must be provided for all dairy cattle 6 months of age or older.

MULTI-SPECIE RULES

1. All wethers must be properly castrated with all wounds completely healed or animal will be disqualified.

2. Animals in group classes must be individually owned by each exhibitor showing that animal and animals must have been exhibited in the show.
3. While purebred animals must be registered and check in registration papers, grade or crossbred animals will be divided by weight and should weigh in with market animals, if they do not weigh in during this time period they will be scratched and be ineligible to show.
4. No bracing agents allowed for sheep and goats.
5. All drugs administered to market animals MUST be declared at time of weigh in and approved by a veterinarian. All residue requirements must be in compliance with the given drug & USDA requirements.
6. All market goat horns must be no longer than 1 inch and blunt (flat, not pointed).
7. All sheep and goats must be fully clipped before arrival on the grounds.

ARRIVAL AT FAIRGROUNDS AND WEIGH IN

1. All animals will weigh in at a specific time by club and will be penned in designated club/chapter areas. Times will be provided prior to the Fair. If you do not weigh in at the scheduled time window you will be scratched from the show.
2. A veterinarian may walk the barns and has the jurisdiction to examine any animal on grounds. All poultry will be inspected by official Poultry Health Inspectors (PHI) upon arrival. All other animals are excused from a formal health inspection; however, any animal with open abscesses or wounds or suspected communicable health problems will not be admitted.
3. Any animal found with a communicable health condition must be removed from the show.
4. All animals must have access to water. If the recommendation of the vet is the animal needs water, it shall be provided to the animal or the exhibitor is subject to disqualification.
5. **All market animals must be tagged before arrival on the fair grounds**
6. The determination of breeds for all market animals will be made at weigh-in by Fair officials. Animals will be classified in accordance with breed standards. The decision of the breed call is final.
7. Animals are entered at owner's risk. The Sacramento County Fair is not responsible for injury or death of any animal.
8. Market animals will only be weighed once, no reweighing. An exhibitor is required to bring animal to the scale. No parents/advisors are allowed in designated area. Steer exhibitors may have assistance on and off the scale if needed, but exhibitor must be present. All steer exhibitors must have yellow slip and bill of sale (1 for transportation and 1 for ownership).
9. Exhibitors must be able to escort animals across the scale on their own. If unable, they will be removed from the grounds.
10. Sheep and goats will be mouthed at weigh in.
11. If an animal does not make weight, it will automatically be put in the feeder division and is eligible to be used in showmanship. Feeder animals do not sell in the JLA.
12. Market animals will be divided into weight lots within weight limitations as desired by management for convenience in judging.

REGISTRATION PAPERS

1. Exhibitors must provide an original registration certificate (not a copy). Breeding animals entered in the Junior department may be jointly owned by siblings provided the animal is entered and exhibited solely and in the name of one individual junior exhibitor, and that the exhibitor is one of the siblings listed on the registration paper issued by a recognized breed association. All entries must be registered and recorded by a recognized breed association in the name of the exhibitor(s). A 30-day consecutive ownership requirement applies to

- each sibling. Animals with a farm, family, ranch or non-sibling owners name listed as the owner are not eligible to enter. (See specific specie or schedule for date and time)
2. Original registration papers are required to be in the possession of the owner on the day of the show or an electronic version available to owner through breed association.
 3. Registration papers will be checked to the animal to verify tag/tattoo/notch/chip numbers.

EXPECTATIONS DURING FAIR

1. All livestock exhibitors must have a stall card on their pens identifying themselves, their animals, and their club/chapter/independent.
2. All livestock must be stalled according to the space allocated by the Fair management. Stalls are not to be transferred without prior approval.
3. Exhibitors must provide all shavings bedding and feed, no straw. Shaving covering devices will be allowed and must be completely removed at the end of Fair. All shaving covers must be maintained and kept clean at all times. No bulk shavings only bagged will be permitted.
4. Barn aisles, pens, alleyways must be clean and clear no later than 8:00 a.m. each morning, including Monday. The aisles in all barns are to be clear of grain, hay, manure, and bedding. Rakes, scoops, shovels, wheelbarrows, hoses, etc. must be put away no later than 8:00 a.m. each morning. All exhibitors are required to assist in keeping the barns clean.
5. All exhibitors must bring their own stall/pen cleaning equipment (forks, rakes, shovels, wheelbarrows, etc.). The Fair will not provide these items or any cleaning equipment.
6. Pens are **NOT** to be cleaned in the evenings, no debris left in aisles, around pillars, etc.
7. Junior exhibitors are required to groom, care for, prepare for showing, and show their animals and/or eggs during the Fair. **No professional fitters allowed.** Exhibitors may obtain instructional assistance from parents, advisors, and other current junior exhibitors, but must be **actively engaged.** Other adults and non-exhibiting juniors are prohibited from assisting any junior exhibitor without permission from the Fair CEO.
8. When it is impossible for an exhibitor to show all his/her own animals, only another junior livestock exhibitor with an animal being exhibited at the Sacramento County Fair is eligible to assist them. Except in the case of excusable absence, the exhibitors must be present in the ring with animals for both show and sale unless prior arrangements have been made with the Fair CEO.
9. No clean-out on auction day. When pens are cleaned, the shavings must be dumped in the manure runs. No equipment will be in barns.
10. In order to comply with the state agricultural code, any milk produced during the Fair must not be sold or given away for human consumption. The exhibitor must provide portable milking equipment.
11. Absolutely no dumping of milk into any drain system on the grounds. Violators are subject to a fine of up to \$500.
12. All shows will start promptly at the times indicated. All exhibitors are expected to be at the show ring on time. **No exceptions.**
13. Livestock animals are considered an exhibit during the Fair. Exhibitors are required to spend time with the general public to answer and educate fairgoers on the positive aspects of animal agriculture.

JUDGING AND AWARDS

1. All market classes will be judged using the Danish & American judging system of Judging. All breeding and showmanship classes will be judged using the American system of judging.
2. The judges may disqualify or transfer to the correct division (at his/her discretion) any exhibit that is not a true representative of the division or class in which it is entered.

3. If there is only one animal in a class, it will be up to the judge's discretion to award first place to that animal in registered breeding classes. If less than three entries are entered in a class, Fair management reserves the right to combine classes to insure proper competition.
4. Feeder animals that make market weight cannot show in a market class, they must remain in a feeder class and will not be eligible for sale.
5. For classes that combine 4-H, FFA, Grange and Independent junior animals, the judge will designate only one overall highest placing animal, i.e. champion or reserve champion, best of breed or best of opposite sex.
6. All awards will be awarded at time of judging and judging results are final.
7. The judge's decision on awards cannot be protested. Protests will be considered only if there has been a violation of State or Local Rules. All protests must meet the requirements as listed in the State Rules. Protests and appropriate action are decided by fair management/fair board of directors. If protests cannot be resolved with the board of directors, the Division of Fairs and Expositions may intervene.
8. If applicable, buckles will only be awarded if there are 5 or more animals in a division.

RED TAG POLICY

This policy is to ensure that livestock exhibited at the Sacramento County Fair are cared for and treated in a humane and ethical manner and that livestock pens are suitable for public display. Livestock exhibitors are solely responsible for the care of their animals while on exhibit at the Sacramento County Fair. If the livestock superintendent becomes aware of any livestock exhibit that is not being cared for in an acceptable state of cleanliness, as determined by livestock management, the following will occur:

1. The livestock superintendent will determine the name and affiliation of the responsible exhibitor.
2. A red tag, with the following information will be affixed to the exhibitor's pen/stall:
 - a. The exhibitor's name
 - b. The observed problem
 - c. The date and time of citation
 - d. Signature of the livestock superintendent
3. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to respond to the red tag by contacting the livestock superintendent within 12 hours of the citation being issued. The exhibitor will formulate and initiate a plan of correction approved by the livestock superintendent. Reasonable efforts will be made by the superintendent to contact the exhibitor's advisor, parent or designee and advise them of the situation resulting in the red tag citation.
 - a. Any exhibitor failing to make contact with the livestock superintendent within 12 hours will be issued another citation.
 - b. Any exhibitor receiving two red tag citations during the Fair will be declared ineligible for further competition, including participation in the Junior Livestock Auction. All Fair premiums and awards earned will be forfeited and the exhibitor will be required to remove their animal(s) from the fairground.

LIVESTOCK AUCTION

1. The Sacramento County Fair is a terminal show, meaning all market animals sold at auction will be processed at an approved harvest facility.
2. The Sacramento County Fair Junior Livestock Auction Committee provides buyers with a photo of the seller/exhibitor. Photos will be of the exhibitor only. Exhibitor will be from the waist up to the top of their head. **All** exhibitors (4-H, FFA, Grange and Independent) who enter market animals must have a photograph of themselves taken in their appropriate complete uniform (as described in previous section). If you have questions as to your organization's uniform; please contact your organization headquarters.

- a. Leaders, advisors, independent exhibitors: Contact Karen Hein at (916) 261-4250 to schedule a time to have your exhibitor's picture or organizations pictures taken digitally. This is a free service until April 30 and pictures will be printed digitally. Any pictures taken after that time will be done for a \$30.00 donation to the non-profit associated with the Sacramento County Fair and available for a limited time in May. No picture, no sale.
3. By entering, the exhibitor acknowledges responsibility in the event their animal is found to contain volatile drug residues or is deemed unfit for human consumption at processing. Adulterated carcasses or those deemed unfit for human consumption by USDA Food Safety Inspection Service (FSIS) personnel at processing are the sole responsibility of the seller. The seller is liable for financial restitution, attorney's fees and civil penalties. The seller will not receive proceeds for premiums, or the sale of the animal. The exhibitor may be barred from any entering any future animals at the SCF.

Qualifications & Limitations

1. Only livestock exhibits entered and deemed market ready at the 2026 Sacramento County Fair will be sold at auction.
2. The following will sell in the auction: market ready beef, goats, swine, lambs, rabbit meat pens, rabbit single fryers, turkeys, poultry meat pens and eggs.
3. Exhibitors are allowed only two market entries in the Fair, however only **one** market entry will sell in the auction with the exception that if one exhibitor exhibits more than one supreme champion or reserve supreme champion.
4. Exhibitors who have two (2) qualified animals for the sale must declare which entry will not be placed in the sale within one (1) hour of the end of the market show. If no declaration is made, the auction committee will choose the highest placing entry for the sale order. There will be no substitutions or changes allowed.
5. Exhibitors **can** pull a market ready animal from the sale after it has been shown for a \$100 fee. If you would like to pull your animal from the auction you must do so at the livestock office within an hour of the completion of that show. If that deadline is missed the animal will go through the sale.
6. Supreme champions and reserve supreme champions must sell in the auction.
7. Exhibitors that miss their auction slot will have their animal go through at resale price.
8. Each junior livestock exhibitor will certify that no unauthorized chemicals have been administered to their animal(s) by signing a "Certificate of Animal Medication" at the time of weigh-in (Form available online).
9. Junior livestock exhibitors may donate all or a portion of the proceeds based on the sale of their market animal to the Sacramento County AG Foundation. All proceeds will be deducted from the JLA checks. The Foundation donation form must be given to the livestock office with the donation instructions by Thursday, May 22nd at 12:00 p.m. in order to be recognized in the sale book.

Schedule and Order

1. Fair management reserves the right to arrange the sale order. Sale order for the auction will be posted in the livestock barns on the Saturday evening before auction. Should anyone have a proposed correction to that order, it must be submitted in writing to the Sacramento County Fair livestock office by 8:00 a.m. before the auction. A special meeting of the auction committee will be held whereby all submitted changes will be addressed.
2. The Junior Livestock Auction will start at 10:00 a.m. on May 24th. The JLA auction will be held on-site and in person.
3. Supreme/Reserve Supreme Champion of each species will be sold consecutively in the Sale of Champions.

4. Under no circumstances will any exhibitor sell more than one animal if the exhibitor has two champions of equal level (i.e. two grand champions or two breed champions). In the event of an exhibitor winning more than one Champion, the exhibitor may choose which will go into the Sale of Champions. No animals will move up in the vacated spot. However, one champion may be donated (100%) to the Sacramento County AG Foundation and sold at the auction (*this rule does not pertain to the Supreme and Reserve Supreme, of which BOTH must sell*). Donation animals MUST follow the same declaration time frame as all animals going through the auction.

Exhibitor Responsibilities at the Auction

1. Animals will be moved to the auction ring and returned to the animal's stall or pre-assigned holding area by the exhibitors.
2. Exhibitors must bring their own animal into the sale ring unless otherwise approved by the CEO.
3. Animals must be clean and presentable. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to feed, water and care for their animals until the animals are loaded for transport on Monday.
4. **The exhibitor is liable for his/her animal until it is loaded onto the truck. Failure to care for an animal after sale and until load out may result in penalties up to the forfeiture of sale proceeds. Exception is only if and when animals are placed in large groups.**
5. All pens of market animals sold at auction must be taken down. All exhibitors are required to be on the premises on Monday, May 25th at 4:00 p.m. to tear their livestock pen down if they aren't able to take them down before that, applies to animals placed in group pens after auction. A \$50.00 tear down fee will be deducted from exhibitor's sale check if pen is not taken down, stacked and banded.

Bidding and Settlement

1. Each animal will be sold to the highest bidder without reserve. Bidding disputes will be settled by the auctioneer declaring "all bids off" and reselling the animal in question.
2. The Fair accepts proxy bids. Proxy forms are available at the Fair office. All proxy bid forms must be turned in prior to the sale.
3. Payment may be made in cash, check, Visa or Master Card. **All payments are due at the end of the sale unless prior arrangements have been made with Fair CEO.** A 20% late fee will be assessed on all outstanding invoices over 30 days. If a buyer has not settled from the previous year, they will not be allowed to purchase any animals.
4. Make checks payable to: **Sacramento County Fair Junior Livestock Auction**
5. Beef Council fees, National Pork Board Check Off and Lamb Check Off will be withheld from the exhibitor's sale check.
6. A sales commission of 6% of the gross selling price will be deducted from each exhibitor's check. This is used by the JLA to produce the auction event.
7. A sales commission of 6% will be deducted from each add-on bid.
8. All "add-ons" must be submitted by May 25, 2026 by 10am. Any add-on that is sent directly to the exhibitor needs to be immediately submitted to the fair office by the close of the sale. If an exhibitor accepts an "add-on" that is not processed thru the fair, they are subject to disqualification from the JLA. If the animal has already been sold, the entire add on amount will be deducted from the sale check and considered a donation to the Sacramento County AG Foundation.
9. **No meat will be released from butcher unless the SCFJLA has been paid in full.**

Thank You Cards and Buyers' Gifts

1. All exhibitors are required to write a thank you note for awards, add-ons and to buyers.
2. All Thank you cards must be turned into the Fair office, or other location, deemed appropriate by the Fair, by May 29, 2026. Junior Livestock Auction checks will not be sent out pending receipt of all thank you cards. Add-on and buyer names will be emailed on Tuesday, May 26th to the livestock advisors/leaders.
 - a. Do NOT mail thank you cards directly to your buyers. Any thank you card that has been mailed directly or handed directly to the buyer, by the exhibitor shall be required to be re-written and submitted through the fair office.
3. In lieu of purchasing gifts for a buyer, exhibitors may make a comparable donation in the buyer's name to the SCAF (i.e., if you would usually spend \$20 on a buyer's gift, that money may instead be made out in the form of a donation to SCAF and the buyer will be notified a donation was made in his or her name. No donation is considered too small or inappropriate).
4. Notification that a donation was made will be indicated in the thank you card to the buyer, but not the actual price amount. The Fair is in no way discouraging buyer appreciation, but instead trying to perpetuate our Fair by offering a solution to those buyers who get inundated by gifts. Also, this gives the sellers who do not have the means or forethought to purchase a gift the opportunity to give special thanks to their buyer. This solution has the most impact on both the buyer and the Fair! The procedure is time tested at many fairs with overwhelming support of both sellers and the buyers. Thank you for being part of the Sacramento County Fair. We appreciate your support and hope you understand why this rule is so important to both buyers and sellers.
5. Market checks will only be released to exhibitors if thank you cards are turned into the livestock office and animal pens are cleaned after animal release.

AFTER THE AUCTION

1. **All exhibits & displays must remain in place until release time, 4:00 p.m. on Monday, May 25th, unless otherwise stated.**
2. Issue of written releases will occur at 4:00 p.m. Monday, May 25th, prior to departure from fairgrounds.
3. Early dismantling of stock, tack or barn displays will be cause for forfeiture of all monetary and Banners, including livestock auction monies, won by the individual and/or privileges as may be deemed appropriate to the circumstances. Removal will result in disqualification.
4. All exhibitors are required to tear down, stack and band livestock pens on May 25th, at 4:00 p.m. Horse stalls are to be "stripped" cleaned before leaving the grounds. Small animal area & pens are to be cleaned, trays emptied and cages put in designated area. **Livestock release will not be given until all areas are checked by SCF personal. Failure to do so will result in a \$50.00 deduction from any premium or sale checks.**
5. Sacramento County Fair is not responsible for lost or stolen items during load out.
6. Exhibitor checks will be available as soon as all buyers have paid for all animals. Sacramento County Fair does not have the funds to "carry" the auction.
7. Checks become void after 90 days from the date of issue. Requests for checks to be re-issued will be subject to a \$40 handling fee.

SACRAMENTO COUNTY FAIR CODE OF PRACTICE/CODE OF CONDUCT/CODE OF ETHICS

BY ENTERING AN ANIMAL IN THE ENTRY SYSTEM, THE SIGNATURE FOR THIS DOCUMENT IS IMPLIED:

The "Code" was developed in cooperation with the California State 4-H, California FFA Association, California State Grange, Western Fairs Association as well as other agricultural groups. We believe this code, when instituted, will help ensure that all exhibitors are on a level playing field, that animals are treated safely and humanely, that food safety is insured and that a positive environment is maintained.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conducts or questionable acts. Exhibitors who violate the "Code" will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with these rules. Expectation of rules and behavior to apply to campground as well as on social media posts.

The following practices or procedures are unacceptable and are defined as being deceptive, fraudulent, unethical and/or inhumane in the care, fitting, preparation & showing of all classes of livestock.

1. All exhibitors must have viable proof of ownership available to Fair and livestock officials at their request. Market animals must be owned and under exhibitor's daily care according to CDFA State Rules for California Fairs. The official ownership date is the date shown on the bill of sale, unless the animal was bred by the exhibitor, in which case calving or birth records must be shown. Registered breeding livestock must show the exhibitor as the owner of the animal on the breed association papers or certificate.
2. No exhibitor will be allowed to show an animal which has been previously sold at an auction or sale as a market animal through another fair or livestock show whether or not there is an actual change of ownership. Any method used to misrepresent the age of an animal for a class in which it is shown is deceptive and considered illegal. Showing an animal for another individual by claiming ownership in order to show in a specific livestock class or event is prohibited. False ownership is illegal.
3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows. No professional fitters.
4. No color enhancing products, paint, dye or other can be used at the fair. If color enhancement is used at the fair, the animal will not be allowed to show. All tails will be natural in nature (i.e. no blue-goo). No twining allowed.
5. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of volatile drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is giving consent by the owner, exhibitor, leader, advisor and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood or other substances from the animal to be used in testing at the owner's expense. Animals not entered in any event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event. If the lab report on the analysis of sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample tested by the lab, to which it is sent, is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said

collection and preservation, transfer to the lab and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the lab pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, leader, advisor or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise.

6. Any surgical procedure, injections or insertion of foreign material, substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation or appearance of an animal's body is illegal. This includes vegetable oil, silicone, air or any other substance used to alter the shape of the animal.
7. By entering, exhibitor acknowledges responsibility in the event their animal is found to contain volatile drug residues or is deemed unfit for human consumption at processing. Adulterated carcasses or those deemed unfit for human consumption by USDA Food Safety Inspection Service (FSIS) personnel at processing are the sole responsibility of the seller. If animals fail to pass ante-mortem inspection, or their carcasses are determined to be diseased or adulterated at processing, exhibitors shall be liable for financial restitution, attorney's fees and civil penalties. Exhibitors may also be subject to disciplinary measures administered by the Sacramento County Fair, including but not limited to, the cancellation of sale transactions and/or reimbursement to buyer.
8. The use of inhumane showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivances or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited. Other practices, unless under the written authority of a licensed veterinarian, that are not acceptable or prohibited include, but are not limited to, liquid diets for lambs, excessive shrinking, excessive exercising, tying animals with the feet off the ground and electric stimulation.
9. Criticism or interference with judges, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed classifiers or show officials before, during or after the competitive event is prohibited. All officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation, respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
10. No exhibitor, leader, advisor, parent or responsible person shall conspire to intentionally violate the Code or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another by affirmative action or inaction to violate this Code.
11. The application of this Code provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by exhibitor, leader or advisor whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this Code of Ethics.
12. The act of entering of an animal in fair livestock show is the giving of verification by the exhibitor or absolutely responsible person that he/she has read the "Code" and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the Code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state or provincial statutes, regulations or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.
13. Any exhibitor staying in the Cal Expo RV Park must have an adult in the RV Park at all times. If exhibitors are found to be unchaperoned at any time while in the park they will be immediately disqualified from the Fair, not allowed to exhibit any project and will not qualify for the Junior Livestock Market Auction. If students are found to be unchaperoned in the RV Park following the JLA Auction, exhibitors will forfeit their JLA auction proceeds.
14. The possession and/or use of alcoholic beverages and/or illegal drugs by any minor is prohibited on Cal Expo property and will result in immediate expulsion from the Fair and forfeiture of awards, premiums and monies received at auction. **This includes the camping facility on the Fairgrounds. Anyone caught violating rules will be disqualified and forfeit all JLA or premium monies.**

15. The use of any illegal drug is prohibited. Legal or illegal substances used to phenotypically alter the appearance of an animal entered in livestock events are prohibited. Use of illegal drugs is considered a premeditated act. Furthermore, any information pertaining to the practice of illegal alteration of an animal will be turned over to the proper authorities for criminal prosecution.
16. In the event any animal is declared by a veterinarian, processor or testing agency to be unethically fitted, the Fair CEO will disqualify the exhibitor from this year's competition & one year following the incident. Reinstatement of anyone disqualified may be made only by the executive director and CEO. The exhibitor will forfeit all titles, awards, prizes, auction proceeds, premiums, scholarships and market/floor money if the animal is disqualified.
17. The management of the Sacramento County Fair (includes, CEO, livestock superintendent or representative of the CEO) reserves the right to amend, add to and interpret the Rules and Regulations; and to arbitrarily settle and determine all questions and differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of, connected with or incident to the Fair. All rules contained in the 2026 State Rules for California Fairs as prescribed by the Division of Fairs & Expositions apply to this Fair.

BY ENTERING AN ANIMAL IN THE ENTRY SYSTEM, THE SIGNATURE FOR THIS DOCUMENT IS IMPLIED:

The exhibitor and his/her parent or legal guardian or leader/advisor hereby certify that each has read, understand and will abide by SCF rules and regulations in this handbook. We further certify that we have not administered and, to the best of our knowledge, any entry from this exhibitor has not received any substance not approved by the FDA and/or USDA. In instances where an animal has been administered a drug that is FDA approved for its species, the exhibitor must be aware that the time it takes for no drug residue to be found in the system is generally longer than the labeled withdrawal time for most drugs.

FFA Novice (Greenhand) – 1st year showing this species in FFA regardless of prior organizational affiliation.

4-H Junior – Exhibitors ages 9 – 13 having prior showmanship experience, in that species, at a California fair.

EXCLUSIONS: Exhibitors who have previously won the Sacramento County Fair master showmanship or exhibitors who have participated at a senior level in a species are ineligible to show as a junior in that species.

4-H Senior or FFA Advanced – Exhibitors age 14 – 19 having prior showmanship experience, in that species, at a California fair and previous winners of the Sacramento County Fair junior master showmanship.

Rules:

1. To be eligible, all animals (with the exception of horses) must be owned by the exhibitor and have been fitted, entered, and shown in an individual livestock class other than showmanship by the exhibitor.
2. The first and second place winners in 4-H Novice, 4-H Junior and FFA Novice may advance to the next class (Novice denotes a first-time exhibitor of any species).
3. **Overall champion in 4-H Junior, 4-H Senior and FFA Advanced are required to participate in master showmanship.**
4. 4-H Juniors choosing to participate, as 4-H Senior, in showmanship competitions, will forfeit their eligibility to compete as 4-H Junior in that species showmanship competition in which they competed as 4-H Senior. A 4-H Junior wanting to participate as a 4-H Senior must provide the fair office with letter signed by exhibitor and their parent or guardian acknowledging they understand the forfeiture of junior showmanship status prior to competition entering the ring.
5. All exhibitors are required to wear the official show uniform of the organization they represent, as designated by the Sacramento County Fair.

1. Overall champion in 4-H Junior, 4-H Senior and FFA Advanced (in each specie) are required to participate in master showmanship. All large animal 4-H Junior winners will compete against each other, all large animal 4-H Senior winners will compete against each other and all large animal FFA Advanced winners will compete against each other. All small animal 4-H Junior winners will compete against each other, all small animal 4-H Senior winners will compete against each other and all small animal FFA Advanced winners will compete against each other. Independent exhibitors are eligible for master showmanship.
2. The Fair will furnish all animals for master showmanship.
3. 4-H Juniors choosing to participate as a 4-H Senior, in showmanship competitions, will forfeit their eligibility to compete as 4-H Junior in that species showmanship competition in which they compete as 4-H Senior. 4-H Juniors wanting to participate as 4-H Senior must provide fair office with letter signed by exhibitor & their parent or guardian acknowledging they understand the forfeiture of junior showmanship status prior to competition.
4. **Large animal master showmanship** will be comprised of 4-H Junior, 4-H Senior and FFA Advanced winners from beef, sheep, dairy cattle, horse, swine, dairy goat and Boer/market goat showmanship are required to compete in large animal master showmanship.
5. **Small animal master showmanship** will consist of 4-H Junior, 4-H Senior and FFA Advanced winners from poultry, rabbit, cavy, dog, pygmy/fiber/Nigerian goat, turkey showmanship are required to compete in small animal master showmanship.
6. All first-place showmanship winners in FFA and 4-H Junior and 4-H Senior classes are required to participate. If an exhibitor wins more than one showmanship competition, they will represent

the first species they win with, additional division wins will allow other exhibitors to moved up. **The next highest placing (up to third place) 4-H or FFA exhibitor from the other showmanship then qualifies for master showmanship.**

7. All species will be judged in groups by judges and scoring them from 1-10 with 10 being the best score. The individual with the highest score will win.
8. In case of a tie:
 - a. Remove the scores from the specie they qualified in, recalculate
 - b. Remove highest and lowest scores, recalculate
 - c. Take the exhibitor with the most consistent scores across all species
9. Exhibitors may compete in both small and large master showmanship. They may only represent one organization for either small or large or master showmanship.
10. 4-H Junior master showmanship winners must move up to senior competition the following year.
11. All exhibitors are required to wear official show uniform of organization they represent, as designated by the Sacramento County Fair.
12. FFA and 4-H Senior master showmanship winners may qualify and compete in senior master showmanship the following year.

2. Sub Novice A: Open to 1st year dogs and 1st year handlers with no training prior to the current year that have never received a qualifying score* in a novice class at any competition. Dogs and handlers in this class are not eligible for any other obedience class at this fair. Exercises are all on lead, and include heel with figure 8, stand, recall, long sit (1 minute), and long down (1 minutes.)
3. Sub Novice B: Open to dogs and/or handlers with more than one year of training who have never received A qualifying score* in a novice class at any competition. Dogs that have earned a Blue Award at a prior district fair in any sub novice class may not enter in this class. Dogs in this class may not enter any other obedience class at this fair. Exercises are same as sub novice A.
4. Novice A: Open to dogs that have not completed a C.D. title nor have they ever received a qualifying score* in a graduate novice class at any competition. Dogs that have received a Blue Award in novice class at a prior district fair or state fair may not enter this class. Exercises are as described in the American Kennel Club Obedience Regulations.
5. Novice B: Open to all dogs that have not completed a C.D. title nor have they ever received a qualifying score in a graduate novice class at any competition. Dogs must have at least one Blue Award but less than three Blue Awards in novice class at any competition. Dogs with three or more Blue Awards in novice class in any competition may not enter this class. Exercises are as described in the American Kennel Club Obedience Regulations.
6. Graduate Novice: Open to all dogs who have not received a qualifying score* in a novice obedience class at any competition and have not received a Blue Award in graduate novice Obedience at a prior district fair or state fair. Exercises are as described in the American Kennel Club Obedience Regulations.
7. Open: Open to all dogs. Exercises are as described in the American Kennel Club Obedience Regulations.

*A qualifying score is defined as a score of 170 or better out of a possible 200 with half of the available points in each exercise according to the American Kennel Club Obedience Regulations.

Rules:

1. Dogs (pure or mixed breed) must have been trained at the level in which they are competing solely by the exhibitor. Dog can only be shown by one exhibitor.
2. Entry must include sex, breed and name of dog.
3. Equipment allowed: a choke collar of either chain or nylon in a size appropriate to the dog. Bait of any kind or pinch collars will not be allowed in the obedience ring. In the sub-novice classes, a 6-foot long leash of leather or nylon is required. In other classes, on-leadwork can be performed on a shorter lead.

4. An exhibitor may enter a maximum of two dogs in this division. No exhibitor may enter more than one dog in any given class, and no dog may enter more than two classes. Note that several classes preclude a dog being entered in any other class (except in the "Team" class)
5. Exhibitors who are members of an organization (4-H, Grange, etc.) must wear the official organization's uniform. Independent exhibitors are expected to dress as if they were showing their dog(s) in an AKC show.
6. Bitches in season may not compete. Uncontrolled or aggressive dogs will be excused from the grounds. The show chairperson shall have the final determination if there is a question.
7. Any dog that is not entered in this show will not be allowed on the fairgrounds.

9. Dogs entered in this show are not allowed in the livestock barns. Show dogs may be kept in a supervised kennel before and after their show. Exhibitors will be responsible for "cleaning up" after their animals.
10. Dogs may only be in show area during classes and are **not** allowed on the general fairgrounds for any reason. Dogs must be on a leash at all times except when showing.

1. Rally Novice A – All dogs must enter and leave the ring on leash. The leash must be made of fabric or leather and needs to be long enough to provide adequate slack. There will be between 10 to 15 stations, not including start and finish, with a minimum of three and a maximum of five stationary exercises per class.
2. Rally Novice B – All dogs must enter and leave the ring on leash. The leash must be made of fabric or leather and needs to be long enough to provide adequate slack. There will be between 10 to 15 stations, not including start and finish, with a minimum of three and a maximum of five stationary exercises per class.
3. Rally Intermediate A – All dogs are judged on leash. The leash must be made of fabric or leather and needs to be long enough to provide adequate slack. There will be between 12 to 17 stations, not including start and finish, with a minimum of three and a maximum of five stationary exercises per class. Intermediate courses will have a minimum of three advanced level signs. There are no jumps in this class.
4. Rally Intermediate B – All dogs are judged on leash. The leash must be made of fabric or leather and needs to be long enough to compete.

Rules:

1. Started in 2005, AKC Rally is a fun family sport and participation increases each year. It's a perfect starting point for those who are new to canine sports as AKC Rally provides a

challenging introduction to all AKC companion events for dogs and handlers to strengthen their skills.

2. Think of an AKC Rally® event as any team sport: You and your dog navigate a course, side-by-side, as you steer him through a course of 10-20 different signs. Each of these signs provides instructions regarding the next skill that is to be performed. The dog and handler move continuously throughout the course with the dog under control at the handler's left side. There is a clear sense of teamwork between the dog and handler both during and between the numbered signs. Although each performance is timed, having a good race time is not the goal; it's all about working as a team while performing the skills, with the dog under control.
3. After you have completed your training classes and you decide to enter a rally trial, there are two levels of competition: novice and intermediate. Scoring is not as rigorous as traditional obedience and all teams begin with a perfect 100 with points deducted along the way. If you retain a score of at least 70 points, you will earn a leg towards a title.
4. **“A” class is for first time entries and “B” class is for those who have titled in that class.**

Rules:

1. Stalls are available to exhibitors for \$40/horse, no bedding will be provided. Shavings only.
2. Fair management reserves the right to limit entries, cancel any division or class, or combine divisions and classes in which the entries are insufficient.
3. A declaration of ownership must be filed with the Fair. All horses must be owned or leased by an exhibitor a minimum of 120 days prior to the show.
4. Each 4-H or FFA exhibitor must have his/her horse project signed up with a 4-H or FFA leader.
5. **Showmanship is not mandatory.**
6. Horses may not be ridden within the parking areas. They must be ridden only in designated warm up areas or arenas.
7. No riding with lead ropes and halters at any time. Exhibitors must wear boots when riding or handling horse/pony. No "riding style" tennis shoes permitted.
8. No lunging except inside the arena or warm up areas.
9. Dogs are not allowed on fairgrounds.
10. No bareback jumping allowed.
11. Each exhibitor must arrive with an adult responsible for supervision.
12. At the discretion of the Horse Show Manager, all non-pattern riding classes with more than 25 entries will be split and separate awards will be presented.

Exhibitor Responsibilities:

1. All exhibitors, parents and leaders are expected to abide by **Sacramento County Fair Code of Practices/Code of Conduct/Code of Ethics**. It is expected that while on the Fairgrounds, all rules will be followed and that exhibitors, parents and leaders will conduct themselves in a professional manner. There will be zero tolerance for any exhibitor, parent or leader that misrepresents the animals being shown in any way.
2. Exhibitors must fall into one of the following performance levels:
 - Junior 4-H: Exhibitors are 13 years of age and under as of January 1, 2026
 - Senior 4-H: Exhibitors are 14 years of age and older as of January 1, 2026
 - FFA: Exhibitors are 18 years of age and under as of January 1, 2026
3. Exhibitors must groom and care for their animal(s) when at the fair. They shall refrain from accepting active assistance from adults and non-exhibiting youth unless the junior exhibitor is actively engaged *and* the assistance is only for instruction.
4. Pony: 14.2 hands and under and exhibitors are 18 years of age and under as of January 1, 2026 (the fair reserves the right to measure any pony).
5. Stalls must be bedded in shavings and all shavings and manure must be disposed of in the designated dumping areas.
6. **All stalls must be completely stripped and cleaned out and shavings and manure must be placed in the alley way for removal on Sunday, May 17th.**

7. No parents, trainers or other non-exhibitors are permitted to ride and/or handle project horses, unless there is a safety emergency at which time an adult may provide assistance.
8. The exhibitor must show his/her own animal in all classes.
9. Horse insurance fees only cover the exhibitor of that animal, and therefore, under no circumstances may an exhibitor ride another exhibitor's horse or pony on the fairgrounds.
10. An exhibitor may not receive professional help in any capacity at any time on the fairgrounds once the official Junior Horse Show has begun. This includes riding lessons and/or coaching from inside or outside the arena and while in the barn areas. Each exhibitor must be in complete control of their horse and aware of their surroundings at all times. Exhibitors must take caution not to create harm or dangerous situations to other exhibitors or animals when practicing or showing their horse.
11. Adults and trainers are not allowed to ride an exhibitor's horse at any time on the Fairgrounds. However, lessons and instruction are permitted prior to the start of the show.
12. There are no circumstances where a horse should require excessive discipline, abuse, or punishment. If a horse does become a danger to people or other animals, it may be removed from the activity for the safety of all riders and horses.
13. Each exhibitor and horse combination may enter only one age or performance level, i.e. senior, junior, pony, walk/trot. No cross entering of divisions. Each horse may only be ridden by one rider. Horse and rider combinations entered in the walk/trot division may not be entered in any other division.
14. Performance classes will be judged according to United States Equestrian Foundation (USEF) rules. Gymkhana classes will be judged according to the California Gymkhana Association rule book. Both of these rule books can be found online.

Equipment and Attire:

1. Safety Helmets: helmet rule (based on California 4-H Equestrian Helmet Policy) effective July 1, 1994, all youth participating in any 4-H equestrian activity, regardless of riding seat, shall wear a properly fitted equestrian helmet that meets ASTM/SEI approval with secured chin harness properly fastened at all times when mounted on an equine or in a vehicle being pulled by one or more equines.
2. Exhibitors must have their helmets checked and approved when they check in for the horse show.
3. Tack: horses must be shown in an approved western bit (including snaffle or bosal hackamore) in all western performance classes. No mechanical hackamores, pencil bosals, tie-downs or draw reins allowed. Approved English bits must be used in English performance classes. Running or standing martingales are not permitted in hunter hack or flat English classes but may be used in jumping classes. Boots and bandages are not permitted except in reining pattern, jumpers and gymkhana classes. Equipment must be all western or all English, not mixed. Use of silver equipment and/or appointments is not to count over clean working tack.
4. Attire: In all performance classes helmets, long sleeved shirts or jackets and boots are required. Do not mix western and English attire.
 - Western: required attire must include a long sleeve shirt or jacket, pants, western boots, and ASTM/SEI safety helmets. If button collar shirts are worn, ties, scarves, and pins are optional. Gloves may be worn. Vests may be worn over long sleeved shirts. Boots must have heels to allow for safety in positioning in stirrups.
 - English: required English attire must include a long-sleeved shirt, and breeches with ASTM/SEI approved safety helmet. Hunt coats are optional. Short sleeved or sleeveless shirts may only be worn if a hunt coat is worn. Jodhpurs are permitted on exhibitors 9 or 10 years of age. Boots must have heel for safety of positioning in stirrups.
5. Showmanship:

- 4-H exhibitors must wear long sleeved white shirts, 4-H tie or scarf, white pants, boots, and belt. Helmet required when riding (no 4-H Hat required when riding with a helmet).
- FFA exhibitors must wear white pants, white shirt or blouse, official FFA blue necktie or scarf, and boots. Official FFA jacket is optional. Pants are to be worn outside of boots.
- Independent exhibitors must wear show whites including a white long-sleeved shirt, white pants, belt, and boots.

OFFICIALLY RECOGNIZED PREMISE EAR TAGS FOR SWINE

With attempts to continually monitor animal traceability, many states are now requiring swine to be tagged with official, federally recognized ear tags for interstate transport. In order to be recognized as an official tag, the information below must be identified on each tag.

Official Ear tag Requirements for Individual Animal Identification (AIN)

- Tags must be tamper proof (designed for one time use) and imprinted with a nationally unique, official animal identification number
- Tags must possess the US shield emblem



Obtaining Official Ear tags

Many farm supply companies offer the purchase of officially recognized ear tags through online stores. Tags will require a Premises ID number and address of premises in order to make a purchase.

Examples of Official Animal Identification Number (AIN) Tags for Swine – 840 Tags

840 Tags: 840 tags comply with the requirements of the Animal Disease Traceability (ADT) framework for both visual and electronic identification. These tags are recognized in a standardized information system between federal, state and industry officials. 840 tags are designed to help provide information on animal traceability.

Both “840 Visual Tags” and “840 RFID Tags” are acceptable for NSR and NJSA swine shows. Since these tags are specific to a Premises ID, they must be obtained by the owner of the premises. They may be purchased through tag supply stores (several online stores available).

1. **Allflex 840 Visual Tags:** The two examples of Allflex 840 Visual Tags below may be ordered through many online farm supply stores. Both of the tags below can print with the purchasers Premises ID number on the tag. Be sure to request to have your Premises ID printed on the tag when making your purchase of these tags.



a. **Allflex 840 Integra Tag (a great option for swine being exhibited at NSR/NJSA events)**

- This is an 840 tag that also provides room at the bottom of the male portion of the tag to print a Premises ID Number.
- A Premises ID Number must be provided when making the purchase of this tag.
- Use SKU: USDA-840GIHM2/GSTF when contacting your supply company to refer to this specific tag.



b. **Allflex 840 Integra Male/Tamper Proof Female Tag**

- This is an 840 tag that also provides room at the bottom of the male portion of the tag to print a Premises ID Number.
- A Premises ID Number must be provided when making the purchase of this tag.
- Use SKU: USDAJUNIOR1/GSM when contacting your supply company to refer to this specific tag.

2. **Allflex 840 RFID Tags:** 840 RFID (Radio Frequency Identification) tags may also be ordered through many online supply stores. RFID tags can be utilized to store and track information through a database using a readable scanner. A Premises ID number is required when making a purchase of these tags and the premises information is tracked to the tags you receive. You may also request to have your Premises ID printed on the male button of the tag at time of ordering. Below are two examples of 840 RFID Tags.



a. **Allflex FDX Ultra EID Tag**

- This is an 840 tag that requires a Premises ID Number when making purchase.
- Use SKU: USDA840FDX/GESM-Y-20

b. Allflex HDX High Performance Ultra EID Tag

- This is an 840 tag that requires a Premises ID Number when making purchase.
- Use SKU: USDA840HDX/GESM-W-20

Other Types of Officially Recognized Ear Tags

National Uniform Ear tagging System (NUES) Ear tags: NUES tags, often referred to as “silver” or “Brite” tags and historically been used for disease testing and interstate movement. State and Tribes administer the distribution of NUES ear tags. They may elect to restrict their use to Accredited Veterinarians or make them available direct to producers as well as through the veterinarians. Producers must contact their State or Tribe animal health official to find out if NUES ear tags are available in their area.

USDA Swine Premises Identification Number (PIN) Ear Tags: PIN tags shown below are intended for breeding stock only. These tags will print with the purchasers Premises ID number at the top and on the back. Producers may request to have a management number series printed on the bottom of the male tag as well like the examples below. Beginning January 1, 2015, many major U.S. packers and processors will require a USDA approved, official premises identification number (PIN) swine tag as a condition of sale for breeding stock. SCRAPIE TAG INFORMATION AND INSTRUCTION

Official Scrapie tag information is required for all sheep AND goats entered at the Sacramento County Livestock Market & Showmanship under the National Scrapie Eradication Program. This is a mandatory program and requires participation by all sheep and goat producers from all 50 states. It includes individual identification of animals (sheep



and goats) with an ear tag or tattoo prior to changing ownership (so that animals can be traced) and to allow testing samples from sheep at harvesting facilities.

What is a Scrapie Tag

Sheep and Goat producers will register and request from USDA approved individual official tags. These are referred to as scrapie tags and are required for:

- **All Sheep and Goats must be identified when changing ownership and prior to transport before a show, fair, petting zoo, or exhibition.**
Exception to the use of Scrapie Tags:
- **Registered goats that have a legible registry tattoo accompanied by a copy of the registration certificate do not require a scrapie tag if their tattoo is registered as a unique entity with the breed association and USDA-APHIS' Veterinary Services office. Exhibiter must bring own reader.**

The scrapie tag identifies **two** specific tracking numbers:

- **Premise number**; also referred to flock, herd or breeder identification. This number will be assigned by the Federal Government and follows a specific format.
 - The first two characters of this number indicate the two-digit alpha state code. For example, if the animal was born in California the first two digits would be "CA". If the animal was from Oklahoma, the first two characters would be "OK".
 - The 4 to 5 digits that follow the alpha state designation is the premise number which has been assigned by the Federal Government for that specific livestock producer AND location.
- **Individual Animal Identification Number**: This is a numbering sequence to identify one animal from the specific premise. It may be one digit or several. This is a numbering sequence that is chosen by the breeder.
- **Both sets of these numbers must be submitted with your entry at the Sacramento County Livestock Market & Showmanship.** This information is to be recorded from the actual tag that is located in the ear of your animal.
- **Some breeders may use a tattoo method or a microchip.** As long as the requirements have been met these are acceptable ways per the Federal Government.
- **It is ILLEGAL to remove or tamper with the scrapie tag once it has been issued.**

It is highly recommended that on your bill of sale for your purchased animal, the breeder indicate the Scrapie Tag information for inclusion on your entry form and to help resolve any issues that could arise. Be sure to bring your original Bill of Sale to the Sacramento County Fair for reference as needed.

How to Complete the Sacramento County Livestock Market & Showmanship Entry

Enter the Premise number followed by the individual animal number

Example number 1; based on the above sample tag: XX2373/1234 would be your entry

Example 2; where the XX on the above tag was identified as California: CA2373/1234 would be your entry

The above entry indicates that animal was born in California at location 12345 (which is on file with the Federal Government) and 000123 is the individual animal number for this breeder.

Missing, Incorrect or Altered Scrapie Numbers

Entries with missing or incomplete scrapie numbers will not be registered as an exhibit until the scrapie number is corrected. Entry fees will not be refunded for entries that are not corrected by May 1 nor will the animal be allowed to compete in the Sacramento County Fair.

All sheep and goat scrapie number for market sheep and goat entries will be verified at the scales during weigh in or for all non-market animals, during the day on Wednesday. Exhibitors with scrapie tag issues will be required to produce the original bill of sale which indicates the scrapie tag Information prior to participation in the Sacramento County Fair. Failure to do so may

result in the disqualification and removal of the animal and forfeiture of the entry fee. **Scrapie Tags that are missing from the animal or appear to be altered are subject to disqualification from the Sacramento County Fair. It will be at the discretion of the Sacramento County Livestock Superintendent and the CEO as to the action to be taken. All entry fees and/or premiums will be forfeited.**
